### Spring 2014

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#### **Classroom Instruction That Works**

Twenty-eight teachers and academic coaches representing five RESA 4 counties attended a three-day workshop January 14-16, centered on the 2<sup>nd</sup> edition of <u>Classroom Instruction That Works:</u> <u>Research-Based Strategies for Increasing Student Achievement.</u> The book reanalyzes and reevaluates the teaching strategies that have the most positive effect on student learning:

- Setting objectives and providing feedback
- Reinforcing effort and providing recognition
- Cooperative learning
- Cues, questions, and advance organizers
- Nonlinguistic representations
- Summarizing and note taking
- Assigning homework and providing practice
- Identifying similarities and differences
- Generating and testing hypotheses

Participants learned about new research that explains the impact that each of the nine teaching strategies has on student achievement, as well as some new insights about how and why some strategies work more effectively than others. Additionally, they discovered how all nine strategies relate to essential 21<sup>st</sup> century learners.

An Instructional Planning Guide was provided in the book that makes it easier for teachers to know when to emphasize each of the instructional strategies and use them to:

- Create an environment for learning that ensures an effective backdrop for every lesson.
- Develop your students' understanding by using their prior knowledge as scaffolding for new learning.
- Help students extend and apply knowledge and move beyond "right answer" learning to an expanded understanding and use of concepts and skills.


# **RESA 4 Hosts the 2014 College Goal Sunday**

College Goal Sunday is a one-day financial aid awareness event coordinated by the College Foundation of West Virginia, the West Virginia Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators (WVASFAA), WV GEAR UP, USA funds, and a host of other college access organizations.

College Goal Sunday consists of a series of financial aid workshops coordinated at locations across the state. The primary goal

of College Goal Sunday is to assist students and families with completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). For 2014, College Goal Sunday workshops were held at 25

locations from 1 to 4 p.m. on February 9. RESA 4 hosted and volunteered services as one of the new sites added this year. Each workshop provides at minimum:



- financial aid materials; and
- free one-on-one counseling with financial aid professionals.

This year the one-day event ended with 1,846 participants, including students and family members staffed by 387 volunteers over the 25 locations across the State. RESA 4 will proudly host the event again for 2015.

# **Bus Operator Training Program**

RESA 4 Bus Operator Training Program is currently conducting classes in Braxton, Fayette, Greenbrier and Pocahontas Counties, with Nicholas and Webster Counties anticipating new classes beginning soon.

- Since July 1, 2013, a total of 35 students have been trained and certified in four counties, with 12 being certified in the months of March and April.
- A total of 82 students from all six counties have completed training and successfully passed certification examinations since RESA 4 began facilitating the training process.
